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

Manufacturing pulls down GDP growth to 4.4%

High frequency indicators like vehicle sales, PMI show growth, says CEA

INDIA'S GROSS Domestic Product (GDP) growth slowed to a three-quarter low of 4.4 per cent in October-December 2022-23 primarily due to a 1.1 per cent contraction in manufacturing, along with weaker private consumption demand and government expenditure, according to data released by the National Statistical Office (NSO) on Tuesday.

Slowing from 6.3 per cent in July-September and 13.2 per cent in April-June quarter, the third quarter reflected the impact of subdued consumption demand and exports amid rising input costs and interest rates as the Reserve Bank of India remained focused on "withdrawal of accommodation".

Jailed minister Jain also submits resignation to CM Kejriwal

IN A surprise move Tuesday evening, Delhi's Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia, who is in CBI custody, and jailed minister Satyendar Jain tendered their resignations to Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal. The resignations, which were accepted by Kejriwal, have been sent to the Office of the Lieutenant Governor, from where they will be forwarded to the President.

The development came hours after the Supreme Court

refused to entertain Sisodia's plea challenging his arrest by the CBI in the excise policy case. The agency had arrested Sisodia on

Sunday after eight hours of questioning. The next day, the Delhi High Court granted the agency five-day custody of the Deputy CM, who also holds the crucial education and finance portfolios.

In his resignation letter, addressed to Kejriwal, Sisodia wrote: "It is very sad that despite working with honesty and integrity for eight years, allegations of corruption are being levelled against me. These allegations are

AMID THE hardening of positions on the Russia-Ukraine war which entered its second year last week, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar will host US Secretary of State Antony Blinken, Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov and

Chinese Foreign Minister Qin Gang among others at the G20 Foreign Ministers' meeting beginning on Wednesday.

Coming days after the G20 Finance Ministers failed to agree on a joint communiqué since there was no consensus on the reference to the Russia-Ukraine war, the Foreign Ministers' meeting is set to test India's diplomatic tightrope walk.

This will be Blinken's first visit to India since the war began last year (he last came to India in July 2021); Lavrov's second visit in a year (he was in Delhi in April 2022); and Qin's first visit as the newly appointed Chinese Foreign Minister. Qin's predecessor Wang Yi had come to India in March last year.

The meeting, which will take

G20 foreign ministers' meeting starts today

place in the Rashtrapati Bhavan premises, will begin with a welcome reception and dinner on Wednesday evening for the visiting Foreign Ministers. This will be followed by a day-long meeting on Thursday, which will tackle six issues in two sessions.

The first session in the forenoon will discuss "strengthening multilateralism and need for reforms", "food and energy security" and "development co-operation". This will be followed by bilateral meetings and lunch.

The afternoon sessions will discuss "counter-terrorism: new and emerging threats", "global skill mapping and talent pool" and "humanitarian assistance and disaster relief".

While India, which holds the G20 presidency, would like a consensus on all these topics, the shadow of the Russia-Ukraine war has polarised conversations in the past.

In an exclusive interview to

The Indian Express, Josep Borrell, High Representative of the European Union for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy who is attending the G20 meeting, said: "I think the Indian position has been made very clear by Prime Minister Modi himself -- 'this is not a time for war' -- and he is right."

"India is renowned as the largest democracy in the world and has a very influential voice on the world scene. The international community needs to come together and ensure that international law will prevail against Russia's blatant violation of and disregard for the UN Charter. It is dangerous for the entire world if a permanent member of the UN Security Council violates, in such a brutal way, international law and rules. Such behaviour, if left unanswered, can only encourage others who decide to remodel the borders or the world

with military means," said Borrell.

"This is an unprecedented situation internationally and will inevitably also have an impact on G20 proceedings. As in Bali, we will work for a G20 declaration that recognises the facts on the ground," he said, adding, "We trust the Indian presidency and we will support its work towards an outcome that reflects the current extraordinary circumstances".

Besides Blinken, Lavrov, Qin and Borrell, France's Catherine Colonna, Germany's Annalena Baerbock, British Foreign Secretary James Cleverly, Italian Foreign Minister Antonio Tajani, Australia's Penny Wong, Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Faisal bin Farhan, Indonesia's Retno Marsudi and Argentine Foreign Minister Santiago Cafiero are among those attending the meeting.

India, which has not explicitly condemned the Russian invasion of Ukraine, is mindful of the challenge at hand as well as the precedent in Indonesia, which could not arrive at a consensus document or a joint communiqué in the 16 ministerial meetings in the lead up to the G20 leaders' summit in November.

Chief Economic Adviser V Anantha Nageswaran said manufacturing, on the face of it, has slowed down but there are enough high-frequency indicators showing fairly robust manufacturing activity.

Manufacturing pulls down GDP growth

For the full financial year 2022-23, NSO has retained the growth estimate at 7% in the second advance estimates. Revised data for previous financial years was also released which saw growth rate for financial year 2021-22 being revised up by 40 basis points to 9.1% from 8.7% earlier. There was upward revision for Covid-period too with GDP for 2020-21 now estimated at (-) 5.8% instead of (-) 6.6% earlier.

Nageswaran said quarter-on-quarter changes are less consequential and since they are not seasonally-adjusted, it should be seen with caution. "We need to be prepared for tighter financial conditions globally, weather-related uncertainties and geopolitical factors. 2023-24 may not see a big-ticket shock as we saw in early months of 2022-23 as the war broke out in 2022 but nonetheless some of the underlying factors are still simmering and we need to be watchful," he said.

With a 7% growth rate estimated for the full financial year, GDP is expected to grow at 5.1% in the January-March quarter. With the revisions undertaken for the previous fiscal, the GDP components for FY23 also underwent revision: government final consumption expenditure has been revised down to 1.2% from 3.1% earlier; private final consumption expenditure is now estimated at 7.3% down from 7.7% earlier; while gross fixed capital formation – an indicator of investment – is seen growing 11.2% as against earlier estimate of 11.5%.

As per the data released Tuesday, India's nominal GDP, which factors in the inflation rate, is set to grow by 11.2% in October-December as against 14.3% in the year-ago period. Gross Value Added or GVA – which is GDP minus net product taxes – grew at 4.6% in Q3. Usually, GVA is lower than GDP. "The tight control on the fiscal deficit and the larger subsidies given this quarter by the government has lowered the contribution of this sector to GVA and GDP," Madan Sabnavis, Chief Economist, Bank of Baroda, said.

Among sectors, agriculture is seen growing at 3.7% in October-December as against 2.4% in the previous quarter and 2.3% in the year-ago period, while the mining sector is seen growing 3.7% in Q3 as against 0.4% contraction in the previous quarter and 5.4% growth in the same period last fiscal.

The services sector, which is the largest component of GDP, posted a growth of 6.2% during the quarter. Construction recorded growth of 8.4% in Q3 as against 0.2% in the year-ago period, while trade, hotels, transport and communication grew at 9.7% in Q3 as against 9.2% in the year-ago period.

In the Supreme Court earlier, a bench of Chief Justice of India D Y Chandrachud and Justice P S Narasimha disapproved of Sisodia approaching the apex court directly under Article 32 of the Constitution, and said he could have approached the Delhi High Court first seeking similar relief.

"It will set a very wrong precedent. An incident occurs in Delhi, that does not mean we are approached," said Justice Narasimha. CJI Chandrachud, too, said that if parties start approaching the SC without exhausting other available remedies, every case will land directly in the apex court.

"Since the petitioner has efficacious alternate remedies available under the provisions of the Code of Criminal Procedure 1973, we are not inclined to entertain the petition under Article 32 of the Constitution, at this stage," the bench said while disposing of the plea.

Senior Advocate A M Singhvi, appearing for the AAP leader, urged the bench to ask the trial court to decide the bail plea expeditiously. "Because if go there, there is a problem of delay," he told the bench. Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the CBI, opposed the request.

Sisodia had cited the arrest of journalist Arnab Goswami and the case against another journalist, Vinod Dua. But the court said these cases stood on a different footing.

"Arnab travelled to this court from a judgment of the Bombay High Court. Dua's case was a case involving freedom of speech and expression where a journalist, albeit in the electronic space, his rights to express himself in terms of handling the Covid-19 pandemic were sought to be, according to him, curtailed by recourse to the law of sedition. That's a very different circumstance. Here you have full remedy which is open to you either in the form of bail before the competent court, section 482 before the Delhi HC," said the CJL.

Section 482 of the CrPC deals with inherent powers of High Courts and says that "nothing in this Code shall be deemed to limit or affect the inherent powers of the High Court to make such orders as may be necessary to give effect to any order under

The book is a veritable action plan – informed by technology and the latest in vaccine research – to anticipate and address the next health challenge.

"Outbreaks are inevitable, but pandemics are optional," Gates says in a blog on his book. In the post, he envisages a scenario where an outbreak is detected by local public health agencies "which function effectively in even the world's poorest countries," and governments sound an alarm, start using "blunt tools" like quarantines and anti-virals that protect against a broad range of pathogens. If insufficient, the world quickly starts work on developing new tests, treatments, and vaccines. No one is left behind, he says, when the systems have already been set up.

Covid-19, which has killed at least 6.8 million worldwide, was marked by a lack of early access to vaccines in the poorest countries. Incidentally, one of India's three health priorities at the G-20 summit it is hosting is to ensure access to such medical countermeasures to all in the event of another pandemic.

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Myanmar national raped by 4

New Delhi: A 22-year-old Myanmar national was allegedly gang-raped by four persons after she was taken to the Delhi-Haryana border, police said Tuesday, adding that the accused are absconding.

A senior police officer said the incident took place on February 22, when the woman, along with her one-year-old daughter, was "forced to board" an autorickshaw from Kalindi Kunj. "The driver took her to the Delhi-Haryana border where he and his three accomplices forcibly took her to one of the accused's house and gang-raped her... then they threatened her and brought her back the next day before dropping her at an unknown location in the city," the officer said.

The woman lodged a complaint at Kalindi Kunj police station on February 26. DCP (Southeast) Rajesh Deo said they are verifying details. "CCTVs around the area where she boarded the auto and where she was taken are being analysed," the officer said. A case under IPC section 376D (gang rape) and 363 (punishment for kidnapping) has been lodged. Police said she had come to the country for medical treatment. ENS

Delhi sees warmest February since 2006

THIS YEAR, Delhi has seen its warmest February since 2006, with an average maximum temperature of 27.7 degrees Celsius.

This was also the third warmest February for the national capital since 1951. In the past 72 years, the highest average maximum temperature for February is 29.7 degrees Celsius recorded in 2006, followed by 27.9 degrees Celsius in 1960 and 27.7 degrees in February this year, according to data from the India Meteorological Department (IMD).

The highest maximum temperature recorded in February this year was 33.6 degrees Celsius and it has remained above 30 degrees on six days of the month. On Tuesday, the maximum temperature was 32.1 degrees, seven degrees above the normal for this time of the year.

IMD scientists have attributed the warmer-than-usual February to the absence of

western disturbances affecting Delhi.

IMD scientist Kuldeep Srivastava said, "No western disturbance has affected Delhi-NCR, resulting in no rainfall and no cloudiness. With clear skies, sunshine reaching the surface meant that temperatures increased in February. Six to seven western disturbances usually affect northwest India, out of which three to four usually affect the plains. While western disturbances have affected the

western Himalayan region, none have affected the plains in February this year."

Against a normal amount of around 21.3 mm of rainfall, Delhi recorded no rain at all in February this year.

The average maximum temperature over all of northwest India – 24.86 degrees Celsius – was also above the normal for February.

While January was colder than usual and February was warmer than usual in Delhi, the IMD forecast for the upcoming summer season points to the possibility of above-normal maximum temperatures over some parts of northwest India from March to May.

In March, maximum temperatures are likely to be above normal over many parts of northwest India.

The IMD has also warned of the possibility of heat waves this summer.

The forecast for March to May issued on Tuesday said that there is an "enhanced probability" of heatwaves occurring over many regions of central and adjoining northwest India.

Flower pots for G20 event stolen in Gurgaon; 2 booked, guards placed

AFTER A purported video clip of two men taking away flower pots, put up by the authorities for beautification ahead of G20 meeting in Gurgaon, and loading them in the boot of a car went viral on social media, Gurgaon police Tuesday registered a case against the two for alleged theft.

Police said the case was registered on the complaint of urban environment division of the Gurugram Metropolitan Authority of India (GMDA).

The complaint stated that the authority had put up flower pots on National Highway 48 near Delhi-Gurgaon border as part of arrangements to welcome delegates for the G20 meeting.

"It has been observed that some passersby are stealing flower pots placed on the roadside. A video of theft is going viral on Twitter... It is requested that considering the importance of the event being organised on a national level, necessary action is taken against the accused and also that police

personnel are deployed for protection of flower plots planted on both the sides of the road," reads the FIR.

In the purported clip, two men can be seen picking up flower pots from a stretch at Shankar Chowk near Delhi-Gurgaon highway and putting them in the boot of a Kia Carnival car with a number plate ending in 0006.

A police officer said, "The car has a Hissar registration number and the owner has been traced to Gurgaon. A case has been registered under IPC section 379 at DLF phase 3 police station. A probe has been initiated in the case. We are identifying the two accused. No arrest has been made so far."

S K Chahal, Joint CEO, Gurugram Metropolitan Authority of India (GMDA) had told the media, "The matter has come to our cognizance and action shall be taken."

Gurgaon will host the first anti-corruption working group meeting as part of G20 Summit meetings from March 1 to 4. The district administration further said that 40 departmental hoardings of the public relations department had been put up and branding done on 44 roadways buses, 275 bus queue shelters of city buses apart from 142 unipoles of Municipal Corporation of Gurgaon. Over a 100 city buses and 18 Volvo buses sport the G20 event design.

Delegates from 39 countries are expected to participate in the event.

In the run up to the event, several roads have been revamped, and plants have been put up for beautification and aesthetic overhaul at certain stretches.

The delegates will discuss anti-corruption measures taken up in their countries and the extent to which the measures have been successful in curbing corruption.

The delegates will share good governance practices followed in their countries and the outcome of the discussion will be shared with all the participating countries and international organisations, said the Gurgaon district administration in a statement on Sunday.

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Mehrauli demolition: Colony not a slum cluster, DDA tells HC

IN ITS response to a plea filed by residents of a slum colony apprehending removal by DDA during its demolition action in Mehrauli, the authority told the Delhi High Court that the colony is not a slum cluster as per Google Earth images and that it was removed in 2012.

The DUSIB, in its affidavit, has said that in the early 90s, the board had identified 929 jhuggis. It is stated that over time, out of these, 675 jhuggis have been listed on DUSIB's website and the board is not providing any service to Jhuggi clusters other than the 675, and the petitioner colony's name is not on it. On the additional list of 82 Jhuggi clusters where the colony's name features as "Jhuggi Basti Goshia Colony", it is stated in the affidavit that the list was preliminary compiled from new jhuggis, "which have not been verified" as per the 2015 rehabilitation policy, hence the list has been "withdrawn and since removed from DUSIB's website" and DUSIB is not providing any kind of facilities to the inhabitants of this list.

In its reply, the DDA has said that Gosiya Colony is "not a slum cluster", relying on images taken from Google Earth in 2006, 2008 and 2010. The reply states that the "entire area was green" and later "around 212 erection of jhuggis commenced". It has said that in December 2012 it removed all jhuggis reclaiming 58 bighas, however, Google Earth Image from March 2022 shows "encroachment in the same area".

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


Another party leader said that the decision was also taken to ward off attacks from the opposition.

"The party stands fully behind the two leaders, but with their resignation, the narrative will also shift from corruption to governance," he said.

Party insiders said that the names of MLAs Saurabh Bharadwaj (Greater Kailash), Atishi (Kalkaji), Dilip Pandey (Timarpur) and Durgesh Pathak (Rajinder Nagar) are being considered for the cabinet posts.

Bharadwaj, a three-time MLA, was the transport minister in AAP's 49-day government. He is the Delhi Jal Board vice-chairperson at present. Atishi has worked closely with Sisodia on education. Pandey is the chief whip of the party and a senior MLA, who was previously the Delhi unit convener. Pathak, the newest member of the Delhi Assembly, is part of the assembly's highest decision-making body—the Political Affairs Committee.

But with two senior ministers gone, the cabinet also requires "heft", an insider said. Sources said that the gap could be filled by Speaker Ram Niwas Goel. The former BJP member was elected to the first Delhi assembly in 1993 from Shahdara. After joining AAP, he was elected in 2015 and 2020.

As per rules, there can only be seven members—including the Chief Minister—in Delhi's cabinet.

BJP top brass discusses plan to strengthen party in Telangana

WITH THE BJP preparing for the launch of an aggressive campaign in Telangana, one of the priority states for the party's electoral expansion plan, top leaders of the party held a marathon meeting to finalise its strategies amidst speculation that the state could go for an early election.

BJP general secretary (organisation) B L Sankthosh, general secretaries in-charge of state Sunil Bansal and Tarun Chugh, national vice-president D K Aruna, Nizamabad MP Arvind Dharampuri, other core group members Sudhakar Reddy (TN co-incharge), K Laxman, G Kishan Reddy, Vijay Santhi, Vivek Venkateswamy, Etala Rajendran, G Mohan Rao and P Muralidhar

Rao also attended the meeting. The meeting comes in the backdrop of Bandi Sanjay preparing to start another phase of his Praja Sangram Yatra to highlight the "anti-people policies" of the Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) government in Telangana. The BJP has successfully undertaken 11,000 public meeting outreach programmes in the state under him. The main focus of the party campaign so far has been on "exposing" the state government under K Chandrasekhar Rao. Prayagraj court seeks police reply on 'detention' of Atiq's minor sons

IN CONNECTION with the daylight murder of a witness, a court in Prayagraj on Tuesday issued a notice to Dhoomanganj police station, directing it to file a report on an application filed by accused Atiq Ahmed's wife alleging that police "illegally" took away her two minor sons on February 24 evening and since then she has no information about them.

The court directed the police to submit its reply by Thursday.

Shaista Parveen, who has been named along with her jailed husband and former MP Atiq Ahmed in the murder FIR, said in her petition that the district police have made her entire family accused in the murder case.

Last Friday, Umesh Pal, a key witness in the 2005 murder of then BSP MLA Raju Pal, was gunned down along with his gunner in broad daylight in Dhoomanganj area of Prayagraj.

Based on a complaint filed by Umesh Pal's wife, former MP Atiq Ahmed, his wife Shaista Parveen, their son, his younger brother Khalid Azim alias Ashraf and two others were named in the FIR.

Police on Monday said that they have killed one of the accused involved in helping the assailants to flee and arrested another for murder conspiracy.

"On request of our petition, the court directed Dhoomanganj police to submit a report on the matter by March 2," said Parveen's lawyer Vijay Mishra.

Meanwhile, the court also rejected petitions filed by Atiq Ahmed and his younger brother Khalid Azim alias Ashraf. In their separate petitions, the two requested the court to reject the police application seeking remand in the latest murder case.

They also said that if needed, their judicial remand be made through video conference, said Mishra. It is to be noted that while Atiq is lodged in a jail in Gujarat, Ashraf is in Bareilly jail.

Police said that they are conducting raids to arrest five persons whose role has come up during the murder investigation. "The role of these five persons has come to light during the scanning of CCTV footage of the murder spot and questioning of Sadak Khan, who was arrested on Monday," said a police officer.

Engineer goes missing from ONGC rig, kin point to colleague role

THE YELLOW Gate police in Mumbai have initiated an investigation into the suspicious disappearance of an electrical engineer, who was employed on a contract basis with the Oil And Natural Gas Corporation (ONGC). The man's family has, however, alleged that his co-workers are trying to cover up his murder and "portray the incident as a suicide attempt".

"I firmly believe that my son was murdered," the former service personnel told *The Indian Express* on Tuesday. Reji, who reached Mumbai along with a few relatives, said, "Enos sounded happy when he called us on Friday. He sent Skype messages to his friends saying that his life was in danger and that if he went missing, these messages would let the world know foul play was involved. He messaged his friend Ajith S, who works with him in Gujarat, saying he would tell him everything in detail once he boarded the train to Vadodara."

TWO DAYS after a Kashmiri Pandit was gunned down by militants in Pulwama, J&K Police said two of the killers were shot dead in an encounter in Awantipora on Tuesday. An Army jawan was also killed in the gunfight.

The Army jawan was identified as Sepoy Pawan Kumar of 55 Rashtriya Rifles. The encounter took place in Padampura area of Awantipora in South Kashmir on Tuesday morning.

"Investigation revealed that both militants had joined different terrorist organisations, but had come together to conspire and attack minorities, outsiders, other vulnerable targets and security forces," police said in a statement.

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"During a search, militants hiding inside a mosque opened indiscriminate fire upon search parties and in this initial exchange of fire, two jawans sustained grievous injuries while killing one militant on the spot," the police said. One of the jawans later succumbed to his injuries.

Civilians inside the mosque were evacuated on time. After resuming the search for the second militant, who was holed up inside a bathroom of an adjacent building, 14 civilians were rescued from the place before he was killed.

They said the two were involved in the killing of a Kashmiri Pandit, Sanjay Sharma, at Achin in Pulwama. Arms and ammunition, including one AK-47 rifle and an AK-74 rifle, and two Aadhaar cards were recovered from the encounter site.

The group had reportedly collected illegal weapons, explosives etc from various places. One of the accused, Atif Muzaffar, had also disclosed that he had compiled information on techniques to fabricate IEDs after collecting material from internet sources," it added.

The agency had claimed that Atif along with Mohammad Danish, Syed Meer Hasam and Mohammad Saifullah was responsible for fabricating the IED planted in the Bhopal-Ujjain passenger train. The train explosion on March 7, 2017, had left 10 injured. This case was also investigated by NIA and is currently under trial, it is learnt.

The NIA spokesperson said investigations in the case had "clearly shown that the accused were members of ISIS and had sworn 'bayat' (allegiance) to the outfit and its leader Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi".

"Atif Muzaffar was the group's emir (leader) and was influenced by the propaganda of Dr Zakir Naik.

THE SUPREME Court has clarified that the Z-plus category security cover provided to Reliance Industries Chairman Mukesh Ambani and family at their own expense will not be restricted to Mumbai. The security cover will be provided to them all over India and also while travelling abroad, it said.

A bench of Justices Krishna Murari and Ahsanuddin Amanullah said that the "highest Z+ security cover provided to them" shall be available all across India and the same is to be ensured by the state of Maharashtra, which is the place of business and residence of respondents.

Appearing for the Ambanis, Senior Advocate Mukul Rohatgi said the Z-plus security cover was provided "in view of continuous threat perception assessed by Mumbai Police and MHA".

The court also clarified that the entire expenses and cost of providing the security cover "within the territory of India or abroad shall be borne by them". The court order came on an

application by one Bikash Saha, seeking clarification of a July 2022 order of the apex court wherein it directed continuation of the security provided to them.

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G20 FOREIGN MINISTERS' MEET

UK Foreign Secy to launch exchange plan, announce Indo-Pacific tech envoy

BRITISH FOREIGN Secretary James Cleverly is visiting India to attend the G20 Foreign Ministers' meeting and to mark a new scheme allowing young Britons and Indians to live and work in each other's country for up to two years, which was announced by the Home Secretary earlier this week.

External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar will meet Cleverly on Wednesday, ahead of the G-20 foreign ministers' gathering in New Delhi. They are expected to discuss progress on the UK-India 2030 Roadmap, which aims to bolster the two countries' ties in defence and security, trade and investment.

During a visit to IIT Delhi on Wednesday, Cleverly will mark the opening of the Young Professionals Scheme, a partnership between the UK and India which allows up 3,000 Britons and 3,000 Indians each year the right to live and work in the other country for up to two years.

He will also announce the creation of the UK's first Tech Envoy to the Indo-Pacific region, who will boost ties with India as a priority.

benefit from new opportunities.

"India is also an emerging global leader on technology and there are immense opportunities for better collaboration between us in this sector. That is why we will be sending our first Tech Envoy to the Indo-Pacific region, to maximise the tech expertise of both countries."

The British High Commission said India has the world's third highest number of tech unicorns and start-ups, with 108 start-ups gaining the unicorn status of a private company valued at more than \$1 billion. On Thursday, Cleverly will attend the G20 Foreign Ministers' meeting to work with partners to advance global efforts on food and energy security, climate change and development. "He will also continue to call Russia out at the G20 and work with partners to mitigate the global impacts of Russian aggression in Ukraine. If the war were to end today, the effects of the exacerbated food insecurity would still run into 2027," the statement said.

Cleverly will also address an India-Europe business event in the capital where he will reaffirm the UK's commitment to conclude a Free Trade Agreement with India.

'We trust Indian (G20) Presidency, country has a very influential voice on world scene'

AHEAD OF the G20 Foreign ministers' meeting beginning on Wednesday,

High Representative of the European Union for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy (equivalent to Foreign minister) JOSEP BORRELL said on Tuesday that it trusts the Indian Presidency and will support its work towards an outcome that reflects the current extraordinary circumstances. In an exclusive interview to SHUBHAJIT ROY, Borrell — who is also the Vice-President of the European Commission — spoke on a wide range of international subjects. Excerpts:

A year after the Russia-Ukraine war, how do you see the Indian position at the UN and other international fora evolve which has sought to balance between the West and Russia. Does the EU want the G20 declaration to condemn Russia's actions?

I think the Indian position has been made very clear by Prime Minister Narendra Modi himself: "this is not a time for war" and he is right. I appreciated his statement, as well as the delivery of Indian humanitarian aid to Ukraine and the help offered to finalise the agreement for the export of Ukrainian grain — which has been blocked illegally by Russia — via the Black Sea. It is important to remember that this war goes beyond the borders of Europe, it has a global impact. India is renowned as the largest democracy in the world and has a very influential voice on the world scene. The international community needs to come together and ensure that international law will prevail against Russia's blatant violation of and

and willing to contribute to this process.

India and the EU have had conversations on human rights issues, including freedom of expression. How does the European Union see the situation arising out of the banning of the BBC documentary in India?

From an EU perspective, freedom of the press, and freedom of expression more broadly, is an essential feature of our open, democratic societies — in Europe as in India. We do not shy away from discussing openly all these issues regularly as we do with all our partners.

How does the EU view China, whose aggressive behaviour in the Indo-Pacific has caused concern. How does the EU view these actions and has it provided India with any assistance to deal with the Chinese threat?

The EU developed an Indo-Pacific strategy in 2021. The aim is to contribute to regional stability, security, prosperity, and sustainable development at a time of rising challenges. It is a positive agenda, not directed against anyone, underpinned by our belief in a rules-based system of world governance and a co-operative approach to international relations. This strategy is in fact very similar to India's vision for the Indo-Pacific. I think that this shared starting proposition as well as a wide spectrum of converging interests open the way for EU-India cooperation in the region. We can work together on a vast number of issues: trade, climate change, the digital transition, the pursuit of

the Sustainable Development Goals, but also security and defence.

India is hosting the G20 summit this year. What are EU's priorities, which it would like India to include in the G20 declaration?

India has set out a very ambitious programme for its Presidency, that we fully support. Several of the topics submitted for consideration to the Group are also long-standing EU priorities. For instance, the fight against climate change: we need to work together to ensure that we stick to the Paris agreement and limit global temperature rise to 1.5°C. At COP 27 we reached an important agreement on loss and damage, which we need to implement in a way that is truly useful to the most vulnerable countries. But looking ahead, we need to double our efforts to make sure that COP28 delivers more than just a repetition of already existing ambitions. There is a need for increased global action amongst the biggest emitters and staunch support to our partners in the green transition. But such a transition needs to be a just one. Because those least responsible for causing the problems are the ones that will be most affected by it. That is why the EU is the first global provider of public climate funds and development aid. The digital transition is another priority of the Indian Presidency of great interest for the EU. We must ensure a "people-centric" transition, which fosters innovation while respecting individual rights and freedoms.

Indian citizens got one fourth of total visas issued by UK in 2022

INDIAN CITIZENS have received one fourth of the total visas issued by the UK in 2022, the British government said Tuesday.

British High Commissioner to India Alex Ellis said, "Last year, the UK issued 28,36,490 visas, out of which 25 per cent went to India, more than to any other country."

Ellis said in a tweet that Indian nationals received the highest number of student visas in 2022 (up by 73 per cent from the year 2021), most work visas (up by 130 per cent) and the largest share of visit visas (30 percent of

the total visitor visas granted).

According to the statistics provided by the UK government, in terms of visitor visas, Indian nationals have overtaken Chinese nationals, who were first in this category pre-pandemic, accounting for 27 per cent of visas granted in 2019, but have come down to five per cent in 2022.

Besides India, the other top five visitor visa nationalities are Nigeria (7 per cent), followed by South Africa, Pakistan and Turkey (six per cent each). The list has been drawn up from among those countries whose citizens are required to obtain a visa before visiting the UK. For instance, the US citizens do not require a visa to

visit the UK, so their actual arrival numbers in the UK may be higher.

Out of 28.36 lakh visas granted by the UK in 2022, visitor visas comprised 49 per cent, 22 per cent were under the study routes, 15 per cent under the work routes, three per cent for family reasons, and 11 per cent for other reasons, as per the UK government's statistics.

As many as 13.99 lakh visitor visas were granted by the UK in 2022, with the largest falls seen for Chinese and Russian visitors compared to 2019. The fall in visa granted is primarily driven by the fall in applications for visitor visas, notably from Chinese, Russian and Saudi nationals.

And because Russia's war of choice, its economy will be weakened, Russia will be strapped for cash and will eventually have to pay for the destruction inflicted on Ukraine. I leave it up to your judgement if this is a reliable partner. It is for India to consider how it can best address its security needs. I hear that there is a major drive towards "indigenisation," and I understand that a number of suppliers from Europe and elsewhere are building important partnerships also when it comes to the supply of defence equipment. These developments are certainly very positive and I know for a fact that many EU Member States are able

Govt cuts tenure of scientist who brought cheetahs

THE ENVIRONMENT Ministry on Tuesday curtailed to one year a two-year extension it had granted to noted biologist and Wildlife Institute of India (WII) dean YVJhalas on his superannuation.

The vacancy arising out of Jhalas immediate retirement, a ministry order said, will be filled up through the ongoing process of recruitment of scientists.

Jhalas had prepared the technical

"Dr Jhalas's tenure was extended for the cheetah work. When he was no longer part of the project, it was only logical that he would be relieved," a senior ministry official said.

When contacted, Jhalas declined to comment.

Jhalas's colleagues at WII said they were not surprised. "The fact that Dr Jhalas rubbed the establishment the wrong way became very clear when he was dropped

(from the task force) last year. He refused to compromise on science, and the situation only went downhill," one colleague said.

With Ranjitsinhji, Jhalas had prepared the first report on potential cheetah release sites after then Environment Minister Jairam Ramesh entrusted them with the survey in 2009. In January 2022, he was the lead author when India finalised the Cheetah Action Plan. Jhalas had also been leading technical negotiations with wildlife biologists in Namibia and South Africa.

Ramesh on Thursday tweeted, "The man who was key to cheetah reintroduction has been shown the door today. Dr YVJhalas was given a 2 yr extension at the Wildlife Institute of

India last year but that's now been curtailed. He's been a strong advocate of a second home for Gir Lion outside Gujarat and has paid the price."

The cheetah's new home, Kuno National Park in Madhya Pradesh, was originally developed as the second home for the Asiatic lion, a species now confined to Gujarat.

Shot down by the Supreme Court in 2013, the cheetah project was revived by the National Tiger Conservation Authority in 2017. In 2020, the SC allowed it "on an experimental basis" under a three-member committee headed by Ranjitsinhji, since "it is not desirable that (the project)... be left to the sole discretion of NTCA".

FACES TRIAL FOR CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE

HC upholds trial court order allowing German national's extradition

NEW DELHI, FEBRUARY 28

THE DELHI High Court has upheld a trial court's order recommending extradition of a German national accused of sexually abusing children and possessing child pornography under the German criminal code in view of the Extradition Act and the Extradition Treaty between India and Germany.

After perusing through the record, a single judge bench of Justice Anish Dayal in its decision on February 27 (Monday) held that there was no infirmity in the order passed by Additional Chief Metropolitan Magistrate (ACMM) recommending the extradition of Bernd Alexander Bruno Wehnelt to Germany to face trial for offences under the German Criminal Code, dismissing Wehnelt's plea seeking to set aside the Extradition Inquiry Report of August 24, 2022, and the order/ letter of September 16, 2022 of the Centre.

"Accordingly, the petition is dismissed and the impugned order is upheld. The petitioner would therefore be extradited by the government of India to the Federal Republic of Germany in accordance with applicable procedure," the HC directed.

The ACMM after going through the Extradition Act and the treaty between the two countries found that since the offences in question constituted a criminal act under laws of both Germany and India, "the principle of dual criminality was duly satisfied and the offences in question were therefore extraditable offences".

Wehnelt was arrested in India in 2020.

Karnataka AAP leader Bhaskar Rao to join BJP

Bengaluru: Former Bengaluru city police commissioner Bhaskar Rao announced Tuesday that he was leaving the AAP to join the BJP. A Karnataka-cadre IPS officer who took voluntary retirement to join the AAP in April last year, and was the party's state vice-president, Rao said there was no "growth" in the party and his attempts to "transform" it had failed.

"I was thinking of changing the party since January and, after a lot of discussion, decided to join the BJP. I have not asked for any post or anything," Rao said.

BJP sources said he might be inducted Wednesday.

AAP sources said Rao hoped to be made AAP state unit chief though he had rubbed many old-timers the wrong way. Still, many leaders admitted that as the party tries to find its feet in Karnataka, the loss of Rao is a big blow. ENS

Report: Karnataka, Gujarat making most progress in shift to clean power

KARNATAKA AND Gujarat are among the major states making the most progress in transition to clean electricity, according to a new report on India's energy transition, prepared by the Institute for Energy Economics and Financial Analysis (IEEFA) along with EMBER.

The report – 'Indian States' Energy Transition' – released on Monday has analysed 16 states, which together account for 90% of India's annual power requirement. The analysis has tracked four dimensions (see graphic).


Based on this analysis, the report devises a scoring system – States' Electricity Transition, or SET – which measures performance of states in the transition to clean electricity.

Karnataka is the only state among the 16 analysed that scored well across all four dimensions. Gujarat was a little behind Karnataka in terms of decarbonising its electricity sector.

Haryana and Punjab have shown promising preparations and implementations for electricity transition, the report stated.

Karnataka fared the best in decarbonising its power sector and

has the highest share (48%) of renewables in its power supply mix.

The analysis found that Karnataka is among the few states overachieving their Renewable Purchase Obligations targets. The state still has a huge untapped renewable energy potential, having installed just 11% of its total potential, it noted. "This highlights the state's opportunity to provide power to neighbouring states through green market mecha-

nisms," it stated.

The report's co-author, Saloni Sachdeva Michael, energy analyst, IEEFA, said, "Bihar, UP and West Bengal should maximise renewable energy generation, and increase commitment to moving away from fossil fuels."

"The long-considered fron-

trunners of adding renewable energy capacity, Rajasthan and Tamil Nadu, have to improve readiness of their power ecosystems for a clean electricity transition," co-author Aditya Lolla, senior electricity policy analyst at Ember, said. FULL REPORT ON [www.indianexpress.com](#)

'Babysitter' gets

jail in 120 cases of sexual abuse

A 45-YEAR-OLD German man who had offered babysitting services online was convicted Tuesday on charges of sexually abusing children in a case that shocked even veteran investigators and led them to uncover numerous other abuse suspects. The regional court in Cologne sentenced the defendant, whose name wasn't released for privacy reasons, to 14 years and six months in prison. It also ordered him held in secure confinement after the end of his sentence. Prosecutors had accused the man of over 120 cases of sexual abuse against 13 children between 2005 and 2019. The youngest victim was a month old. AP

Two senior IS members killed

TWO SENIOR regional members of the Islamic State group have been killed in Afghanistan in recent weeks in separate operations by the Taliban security forces, a Taliban spokesman said Tuesday. Taliban forces killed Qari Fateh, the regional IS intelligence and operations chief, during a raid in Kabul over the weekend, Zabiullah Mujahid, the main spokesman for the Taliban government, said in a statement. Bibi ally, deputy minister quits

AN ULTRANATIONALIST ally of PM Benjamin Netanyahu has tendered his resignation as a deputy minister in the new government. Avi Maoz's departure was the first crack in Netanyahu's ruling coalition, which assumed office in late December after securing a parliamentary majority. Maoz, the head of a small ultranationalist faction known for his homophobic rhetoric and disparaging remarks about non-Orthodox Jews, said he would step down as a deputy minister, but would continue to vote with the coalition in parliament. Netanyahu's ruling coalition holds 64 seats in the 120-seat Knesset. AP

Arrest warrant against Imran in gifts case as supporters reach Islamabad

A PAKISTANI court on Tuesday issued a non-bailable arrest warrant against former prime minister Imran Khan in the Toshakhana case but he was granted bail in three other cases, amid high drama outside the court premises where thousands of his supporters converged to support their leader.

Khan, the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) chief, travelled from his Zaman Park residence in Lahore to Islamabad, his first appearance here in the federal capital after being shot at a public rally in November last year.

The four cases include prohibited funding at a banking court located at the judicial complex here, a terrorism case at the anti-terrorism court in the same complex.

The third was related to the Toshakhana, which was scheduled at the sessions court in F-8 Kachehri, situated half-an-hour drive from the judicial complex.

The court issued a non-bailable arrest warrant against Khan and adjourned the hearing till

tempted to murder case at the same sessions court.

Additional sessions judge Zafar Iqbal issued a non-bailable arrest warrant against the 70-year-old former prime minister in the Toshakhana case.

The court issued a non-bailable arrest warrant against Khan and adjourned the hearing till

March 7 for his repeated failure to appear before the court.

His indictment, in this case, was earlier postponed twice due to his failure to appear in court. Khan has been in the crosshairs for buying gifts, including an expensive Graff wristwatch he had received as the premier at a discounted price from the state

depository called Toshakhana and selling them for profit.

The former cricketer-turned-politician was, however, granted bail in all the other three cases, even as thousands of his supporters thronged the judicial complex here in his support, prompting security officials to beef up security.

The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) in October last year filed a case in an Islamabad-based banking court against Khan and other PTI leaders over allegedly receiving prohibited funding.

The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) last year found the party guilty of concealing that it had received the money and also disqualified Khan.

The prohibited funding case was filed by estranged PTI founding member Akbar S Babar in the ECP in 2014.

Khan has not attended any hearings since November last year when he was injured in an assassination bid at his rally in the Wazirabad of Punjab province. He has since received extensions on his bail on medical grounds. PTI

Foreign aid cut in Haley plans: 'US won't pay bad guys... be world's ATM'

INDIAN-AMERICAN Republican presidential candidate Nikki Haley on Tuesday made it clear that if she is voted to power in 2024, the US will not be the "world's ATM" and pay "bad guys" hundreds of millions of dollars.

In the op-ed in the *New York Post*, Haley wrote that America spent USD 46 billion on foreign aid last year, which is given to countries like China, Pakistan, and Iraq. American taxpayers deserve to know where that money is going and what it's doing, she added.

"A weak America pays the bad guys: Hundreds of millions to Pakistan, Iraq, and Zimbabwe last year alone. A strong America won't be the world's ATM," the former Ambassador to the United Nations tweeted.

In another tweet, Haley said: "America can't be the world's ATM. As president, we'll make sure to shake up the foreign policy establishment. More on our plans to stop sending money to our enemies..."

"I will cut every cent in foreign aid for countries that hate us. A strong America doesn't pay off the bad guys. A proud America doesn't waste our people's hard-earned money. And the only leaders who deserve our trust are those who stand up to our enemies and stand beside our friends," the 51-year-old two-term Governor of South Carolina said.

Haley earlier this month formally launched her 2024 presidential bid.

Nigeria tense as Opposition alleges rigging, seeks revote

NIGERIA'S OPPOSITION demanded a revote Tuesday for the country's presidential election, where the partial results show an early lead for the ruling party.

At a press conference in the capital Abuja, the three main opposition parties said the election was an insult to democracy and called for Nigeria's election chief to resign.

"The conduct of the 2023 election has been marred by widespread violence, rigging, intimidation of voters, doctoring of results and violation of the laid down electoral process, which was communicated by the national electoral body," said Julius Abure, chairman of the Labour Party.

While the press conference was taking place, dozens of protesters took to the streets of Abuja and in the southern Delta state, accusing the election commission

of disenfranchising voters.

Results from Saturday's presidential and parliamentary elections in Africa's most populous nation have been trickling in, with 14 of its 36 states votes announced.

The ruling party—the All Progressives Congress—candidate, Bola Tinubu is in the lead with the main opposition candi-

date from the Peoples Democratic Party, Atiku Abubakar, trailing closely.

Parties have three weeks to appeal results, but an election can't be invalidated unless it proves that the national electoral body largely didn't follow the law and conducted actions which could change the final result. AP

UN report says found particles of Uranium enriched up to 83.7% in Iran

INSPECTORS FROM the United Nations nuclear watchdog found uranium particles enriched up to 83.7 per cent in Iran's underground Fordo nuclear site, a report seen on Tuesday by *The Associated Press* said.

The confidential quarterly report by the Vienna-based International Atomic Energy Agency distributed to member states likely will renew tensions between Iran and the West over its programme.

The IAEA report, which only speaks about "particles", suggests that Iran isn't building a stockpile of uranium enriched above 60 per cent—the level it has been enriching at from some time.

Tensions have been growing since Bloomberg first reported on February 19 that inspectors from the International Atomic Energy Agency had detected uranium particles enriched up to 84 per cent in Iran.

A spokesman for Iran's civilian nuclear programme, Behrouz Kamalvandi, sought last week to portray any detection of uranium particles enriched to that level as a momentary side effect of trying to reach a finished product of 60 per cent purity.

However, experts say such a great variance in the purity even at the atomic level would appear suspicious to inspectors.

Iran's 2015 nuclear deal limited Tehran's uranium enrichment to 3.67 per cent—enough to fuel a nuclear power plant. The US' unilateral withdrawal from the accord in 2018 set in motion a series of attacks and escalations by Tehran over its programme.

Iran has been producing uranium enriched to 60 per cent purity—a level for which nonproliferation experts already say Tehran has no civilian use. Any accusation of enrichment higher than that further ratchets up tension over the programme.

Uranium at 84 per cent is nearly at weapons-grade levels of 90 per cent—meaning any stockpile of that material could be quickly used to produce an atomic bomb if Iran chooses.

The while the IAEA's director-general has warned Iran now has enough uranium to produce "several" nuclear bombs if it chooses, it likely would take months more to build a weapon and potentially miniaturise it to put it on a missile.

Prachanda to reshuffle Cabinet

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IF UKRAINE claims the drones, particularly the one that landed near Moscow, it would be its closest attempt to strike the Russian capital since Russia invaded Ukraine more than a year after its full-scale invasion of its neighbor.

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One drone crashed just 100 kilometres away from Moscow in an alarming development for Russian defenses.

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While Putin didn't refer to any specific attacks in a speech in the Russian capital, his comments came hours after drone attacks targeted several areas in southern and western Russia and authorities closed the airspace over St. Petersburg in response to what some reports said was a drone.

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Also Tuesday, several Russian television stations aired a missile attack warning that officials blamed on a hacking attack. The drone attacks caused no casualties but provoked a security stir as the war with Kyiv stretched into its second year last week.

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One of the drones fell near the village of Gubastovo, 100 kilometres from Moscow, Andrei Vorobiov, governor of the region of Bakhmut where the commander of Ukraine's ground forces described the situation as "extremely tense".

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"Despite significant losses,

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the enemy threw in the most prepared assault units of Wagner,

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who are trying to break through the defences of our troops and surround the city," Ukraine's Colonel General Oleksandr Srytskyi said in a statement.

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The drone didn't inflict any damage, Vorobiov said. He didn't specifically describe the drone as Ukrainian, but said that it likely targeted a civilian infrastructure object.

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Pictures of the drone showed it was a Ukrainian-made type. It reportedly has a range of up to 800 kilometres, but isn't capable of carrying a large load of explosives.

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Russian forces early Tuesday shot down a Ukrainian drone over the Bryansk region, while three drones also targeted Belgorod region on Monday.

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Sisodia case: how the right against self-incrimination works

THE SUPREME Court on Tuesday refused to hear a plea by Delhi Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia seeking bail in the excise policy case after a Delhi court on Monday remanded him in CBI custody till March 4.

The Supreme Court approved of Sisodia approaching it directly under Article 32 of the Constitution when the remedy of moving the High Court under Section 482 of the CrPC was available to him.

Special CBI Judge MK Nagpal had granted CBI Sisodia's custody on the grounds that he had "failed to provide satisfactory answers" during investigation. The court had rejected Sisodia's arguments that he had a right against self-incrimination.

What is an individual's right against self-incrimination?

The right against self-incrimination has

its origins in Roman law, and evolved as a distinct right in the English jurisprudence. The Fifth Amendment in the United States Constitution says "No person shall be... compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself...without due process of law...", a right that is colloquially referred to as "taking/ pleading the Fifth".

Article 20(3) in Part III (Fundamental Rights) of the Indian Constitution says, "No person accused of any offence shall be compelled to be a witness against himself."

The right to be presumed innocent until proven guilty, and the right to remain silent in an interrogation essentially flow from this constitutionally guaranteed right against self-incrimination. This right also ensures that police cannot coerce anyone to confess to a crime, and obtain a conviction based on that confession.

How does the right against self-incrimination apply in criminal cases?

Since the onus of proving the case against

the accused beyond reasonable doubt is on the state, a person cannot be compelled to testify against himself or share information that might go against him in a trial.

In the landmark 1961 verdict in *The State of Bombay versus Kathi Kalu Oghad*, an eleven-judge Bench of the Supreme Court ruled that obtaining photographs, fingerprints, signatures, and thumb impressions would not violate the right against self-incrimination of an accused. The court distinguished "to be a witness" from "furnishing evidence".

In 2019, the Supreme Court in its ruling in *Ritesh Sinha versus State of Uttar Pradesh* broadened the parameters of handwriting samples to include voice samples, adding that this would not violate the right against self-incrimination.

Earlier in 2010, in *Selvi v State of Karnataka*, the Supreme Court held that a narcoanalysis test without the consent of the accused would amount to violation of the

right against self-incrimination.

However, obtaining a DNA sample from the accused is permitted. If an accused refuses to give a sample, the court can draw adverse inferences against him under Section 114 of the Evidence Act.

What happened in Sisodia's case?

The CBI told the special court that it would need custody of the accused since he was evasive during the interrogation.

Senior advocate Dayan Krishnan, who appeared for Sisodia, said that cannot be a ground for seeking remand: "Their case is I (Sisodia) did not answer in the way they wanted me to answer. I will show why that is not a ground for remand." He argued that if the court granted remand for self-incrimination, "then that would be a travesty".

What was the reasoning of the court?

In his order granting remand, judge

Nagpal sought to differentiate between "giving legitimate answers" and protecting the right against self-incrimination. The judge did not elaborate on what would be counted as "legitimate" answers.

"It is true that he cannot be expected to make self-incriminating statements, but the interests of justice and of a fair investigation require that he should come up with some legitimate answers to the questions which are being put to him by the IO," the order stated.

"Some of his subordinates are found to have disclosed certain facts which can be taken as incriminating against him and some documentary evidence against him has also already surfaced and a proper and fair investigation requires that some genuine and legitimate answers to the questions being put to him about the same are to be found and hence, in considered opinion of this court, this can only be done during custodial interrogation of the accused..." the court said.

On what grounds did the SC reject Sisodia's plea on Tuesday?

The SC refused to intervene in Sisodia's arrest "at this stage". He had moved the SC under Article 32, which gives citizens the right to approach the top court when their fundamental rights are violated.

A Bench headed by Chief Justice of India DY Chandrachud asked Sisodia to "avail alternative remedies" under Section 482 CrPC, under which no provision in the CrPC can "limit or affect the inherent powers of the High Court to make such orders as may be necessary to give effect to any order under this Code, or to prevent abuse of the process of any Court or otherwise to secure the ends of justice".

Senior advocate Abhishek Manu Singhvi argued that the SC had in other cases, including those of journalists Arnab Goswami and Vinod Dua, entertained petitions directly under Article 32. However, the CJL said that those cases involved free speech issues, while Sisodia's is under the Prevention of Corruption Act.

Windsor Framework

The framework has two crucial aspects – a green lane and red lane system for goods, and the 'Stormont Brake'.

British goods meant for Northern Ireland will use the green lane at the ports, and will be allowed to pass with minimal paperwork and checks. This is especially significant for meat products like sausages, as the EU has stricter rules about animal products. Medicines and plants can move smoothly, and pets can travel without "expensive health treatments like rabies or documentation from a vet", says the UK government's website. Goods destined for Ireland or the rest of the EU will have to take the red lane, with the attendant customs and other checks.

Stormont Brake

The new Stormont Brake means the Northern Ireland Assembly "can oppose new EU goods rules that would have significant and lasting effects on everyday lives in Northern Ireland," the UK government said. They will need the support of 30 members from at least two parties.

THE MINISTRY of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI) Tuesday released economic growth data – Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and Gross Value Added (GVA) – for the third quarter (Q3 or October to December) of the current financial year (2022-23 or FY23), as well as the so-called Second Advance Estimates (SAEs) for the full year.

What are GDP and GVA?

Both GDP and GVA measure India's economic growth.

The GDP does this by adding up who spent how much; it thus captures the "demand" in the economy.

The GVA calculates the same national income from the supply side. It adds up the value added (in money terms) by the different sectors of the economy.

Under GDP, there are four main heads:

■ Private Final Consumption Expenditure (PFCE) or the money spent by people on goods and services for personal consumption; this is the biggest contributor of GDP, accounting for almost 55%-60%

■ Government Final Consumption Expenditure (GFCE) or the money spent by governments towards its daily needs; this accounts for 10% of GDP.

■ Gross Fixed Capital Formation (GFCF) or the money spent by private firms and governments towards building productive capacities (investments); this is accounts for 30%-32% of GDP.

■ Net of exports and imports; this is typically a negative impulse to GDP because imports are more than exports, implying money going out of the country.

GDP and GVA are related as follows: GDP = GVA + Taxes levied by governments on products (excise duties, sales tax, service tax, import and export duties) - subsidies provided by government on products (food, petroleum and fertiliser subsidies)

Typically, the absolute level of GDP is more than the absolute level of GVA because taxes received are more than subsidies spent by the government.

What data has been released?

For any financial year, say 2019-20, the GDP estimates go through several rounds of revisions. Each year in January, MoSPI re-

leases the First Advance Estimates for that financial year. In February end, after incorporating the Q3 data, come the Second Advance Estimates. By May-end come the Provisional Estimates (PEs) after incorporating the Q4 (Jan to March) data.

Then with each passing year, the PEs are revised to give the First Revised Estimates, the Second Revised Estimates and the Third Revised Estimates before settling on the "Actuals". Each revision benefits from more data, making the GDP estimates more accurate and robust.

On Tuesday, apart from the Q3 and SAEs for FY23, the MoSPI also released the scheduled revisions to the economic growth rate for three preceding financial years – FY20 (pre-Covid), FY21 (the Covid year), and FY22.

What does the data for Q3 show?

On the GDP front (see Table 1), the growth rate has decelerated to just 4.4% in Q3. This is below the expected level.

The main growth impulse has come from the spending towards investments in the economy. At one level this is heartening news. Increase in investments typically augurs well for sustaining an economy's growth momentum.

However, economists such as Pranjul Bhandari of HSBC have characterised the growth in investments as "fragile". "It is true that central government capex has picked

up (for instance the post-monsoon rise in road construction), but on the other hand, state capex has been weak," she states in a research note.

The biggest worry has been on the personal consumption front. A slowdown in private consumption, the biggest engine of GDP growth, can eventually disincentivise investments.

The contraction of government's expenditures is likely the result of the government trying to meet fiscal deficit parameters.

On the GVA front (see Table 2), the biggest story is the contraction in manufacturing. This is the second consecutive quarter when manufacturing, which is often viewed as a source of creating jobs, has contracted. But robust growth in the construction sector as well as services (both financial and non-financial) are a relief.

What do the SAEs for FY23 show?

For the full-year, the economy is still expected to grow by 7% – same as the First Advance Estimates predicted in January. However, not only has the economy grown slower than expected in Q3, even Q1 GDP growth has been revised down – suggesting India is rapidly losing its growth momentum.

As such, achieving the 7% for the full year appears difficult. HSBC's Bhandari, for instance, expected a growth rate of 6.8% for FY23.

"Based on today's numbers and our study of other activity indicators, we believe that overall growth momentum is softening, as pent-up demand from the lockdown period fades, exports weaken, and tighter fiscal and monetary policy rates take their toll. We expect GDP growth to slow from 6.8% in FY23 to 5.5% in FY24," states Bhandari.

India's economy was fast losing momentum before Covid-19 led to a contraction. Coming out of the Covid pandemic, India's economy has reclaimed the mantle of the fastest-growing major economy in the world. However, data suggests that India is losing this momentum, whereby it is likely to slow down from 9.1% in FY22 to under 7% in FY23 and further decelerate to well under 6% in the coming financial year.

GROWING PAINS

NSO projects economic growth at 7 per cent in 2022-23. But outlook for next year is clouded by tightening monetary policy

ON TUESDAY, THE National Statistical Office released the second advance estimates of national income for the ongoing financial year. These latest estimates have pegged the Indian economy to grow at 7 per cent in 2022-23, in line with the statistical office's earlier figures released in January. Alongside, the NSO has also released its quarterly estimates, as per which the economy grew at 4.4 per cent in the third quarter of this year (October-December). Based on these numbers, growth for the fourth quarter (January-March) of this financial year is expected to be around 5.1 per cent. Taken together, these estimates suggest that as the base effect fades, the Indian economy is likely to grow at 4.7 per cent in the second half of this year, down from 9.5 per cent in the first half.

Disaggregated data paints a more mixed picture. The agricultural sector is expected to continue to grow at a healthy pace, at 3.7 per cent in the third quarter, with growth for the full year projected at 3.3 per cent. But this projection assumes a bumper rabi crop and no damage from rising temperatures. The effects of the latter will only be known at the time of harvesting. On the other hand, the performance of the manufacturing sector has been rather dismal. For the full year, the sector is expected to barely register a rise. In fact, in both the second and third quarters of the year, value added by the sector has actually contracted. Some analysts have attributed this to higher input costs putting firm margins under pressure. The services sector has fared better as demand continues to normalise. Both the trade, hotels, transport and communication and the financial, real estate and professional services sectors have continued to register healthy growth rates. Investment activity also appears to have held up in the third quarter. But the consumption side of the data paints a worrying picture, with both private and government consumption being subdued. Government consumption in the third quarter was actually lower than in the same period last year, while growth in private consumption has slowed down sharply. This is at odds with most analysts' expectations of household demand perking up during the festive season.

The NSO's first advance estimates released in January were based on data on economic indicators only for the first seven to eight months of the year. The latest estimates have been able to incorporate more recent data into the assessment process. But while the numbers have been affected by revisions to previous data, the estimates are broadly in line with the government's and Reserve Bank of India's expectations. For the upcoming financial year, the RBI has projected economic growth to slow down to 6.4 per cent. But, considering the extent of tightening of monetary policy, both globally and domestically, there are downside risks to this forecast.

LISTEN TO THE COURT

SC warning against renaming places by abusing history, and invoking it selectively, is valuable and timely

ON MONDAY, A two-judge bench of the Supreme Court issued a timely warning against ahistorical appropriations of the past. Dismissing a PIL that sought the Court's intervention in restoring the "original names" of places "renamed by barbaric invaders," the bench said that the "country cannot remain a prisoner of the past". The petitioner had contended that several roads, public places and cities in the country are named after "foreign looters" and argued that the "benevolent nature of Hinduism had resulted in it being wiped out from Pakistan and Afghanistan". The bench admonished him for going by the playbook of those who "invoke history selectively" to create "schisms in society". "You want to keep the country on the boil. Let us not break society with such kinds of petitions," it said, and observed that such renaming projects take away focus from important governance-related imperatives.

Moves to rename places are rarely innocent of short-term politics. European names, for instance, were grafted onto towns, cities and countries in several parts of the world during the so-called Age of Discovery in the 15th to 18th centuries. Constantinople was renamed Istanbul in 1930, and the urge to reverse colonial legacies led to changes in the names of several places in India immediately after Independence. In recent times, such renaming exercises have become the stock-in-trade of the votaries of identity politics who obsess about "outsiders", "invaders" and "looters". The association of such usage with majoritarian politics is unmistakable and the erasure of historical context and nuance in such projects is conspicuous — whether it be the renaming of Aurangzeb Road in Delhi or changing the names of Allahabad and Mughalsarai in Uttar Pradesh. The petitioner to the Supreme Court spoke of Mahmud of Ghazni and Ibrahim Lodhi in the same breath, even though the two medieval kings have vastly different ancestries and are separated by nearly five centuries. "What is the relationship of Aurangzeb, Ghazni and Lodhi with India," he asked and rued that several places in Delhi are named after these rulers, "but none after the Pandavas". This failure to come to terms with the past rightly invited the apex court's censure. "Can you wish away invasions from history? What are you trying to achieve?" it asked.

The apex court concluded by reaffirming the "rule of law, secularism and constitutionalism" and cautioning against bigotry. Its directive to abide by "the principle of fraternity enshrined in the Constitution's Preamble" and its words of caution against the abuse of history must be heard.



Embassy of South Korea's dance video is a tribute by one soft powerhouse to another

LED BY AMBASSADOR Chang Jae-bok, the Embassy of South Korea in New Delhi danced its way into Indian hearts to the beats of the hit song 'Naatu Naatu', from RRR. With some of the dancers dressed in the traditional Korean hanbok, the Embassy team gamely executed the song's popular hook step, even performing the turbo-charged "dance-off" that it ends with. The reaction of Indians to the video shared on the embassy's social media accounts has been uniformly warm and welcoming — even the Prime Minister chimed in, describing the dance as a "lively and adorable team effort".

While the Embassy's video is no doubt an endearing diplomatic gesture from one soft power to another, the evident enthusiasm of the dancers also speaks of the irresistible allure of a catchy song. The Golden Globe-winning 'Naatu Naatu' is one of the highlights of the international juggernaut that is RRR — it recently picked up another award at the Hollywood Critics Association (where RRR won four other prizes, including for Best International Film), and has been nominated for Best Original Song in the upcoming Academy Awards. The song has developed a dedicated fan base, seemingly independent of the movie, spawning a number of social media "dance challenges" and viral covers.

The effect of the South Korean wave — known as Hallyu — has been felt all over the world for at least 20 years now, from pop music acts such as BTS, Blackpink and Girls' Generation, to K-dramas like Crash Landing on You, Reply 1988 and Squid Game. Indians too have been in its thrall for almost as long, forming some of the most dedicated K-pop and K-drama fandoms in the world. For all the joy that South Korean pop culture has given to people in this country, it is nice to give some of it back with a little naatu naatu.

IN 1989 THE Congress party lost the tag of being a "dominant" party. Since then, it has not figured out how to remain competitive in a multi-party, federal polity. As the next Lok Sabha elections stare the party in the eye, it continues to face the same challenges that have haunted it over the past three decades and more. While the usual compulsions and hang-ups ensured that the party treaded extremely cautiously on most matters at its Raipur session recently, it at least seemed that the stagnant party moved a little in its journey from Udaipur to Raipur.

While Congress reneged on its Udaipur promise of holding elections to party positions, there were at least three small achievements for the party. First, between Udaipur and Raipur, though individuals kept leaving the party, Congress could avoid a major split or exodus. Two, it now had a president elected through a contest after a long gap and that too from outside the Gandhi family. Three, and potentially most significantly, the party resolved to have half the CWC seats filled from marginalised sections and the youth. One suspects that in order to improve its electoral fortunes, the party may have to do a lot more than this.

In view of the challenge of 2024, the party needed to act more earnestly on two fronts: Organisational consolidation and immediate political action for mobilisation. This did not happen at Raipur. The dilemmas the party faces on both these fronts are not new and this writer listed them five years ago ('Letter from Rahul Gandhi', Economic and Political Weekly, February 18, 2018).

The essence of the Udaipur chintan shivir was the democratisation of the functioning of the party. This is neither for merely moral purposes nor only to silence critics. The objective is to revitalise the organisation. But at Raipur, the party balked at elections for CWC membership. Such elections could have helped ensure that the members would truly have a base in the grassroots of the party; it would also have helped in its greater federalisation. As it is, the party is short of mass leaders. It badly needs leaders who have the support of not only their own factions or state units but also the ability to reach out to other states and other parties. Having elected the party presi-

dent, giving him the power to nominate CWC members neutralises the limited representativeness achieved through his election. The party could easily have found a more collective way to make the nominations to ensure that the spirit of representative authority was maintained at least minimally. Kharje might informally engage in consultations and might also end up doing the balancing act but that is beside the point. The issue was to ensure a churn in the party, a brainstorming among its top leaders and an ability to bring together competing leaders with many ambitions and then to mediate among them.

Just like elections, the idea of "one family-one post" was also quietly buried. While media wisdom attributes this to the wish to protect the Gandhi family, this has more to do with the entrenched interests of many families that control local party units. The term "dynastic politics" is often narrowly understood in terms of the top leadership of parties. In reality, this is more about the way local politics is conducted and thwarts the entry of young activists into competitive politics. Therefore, a departure from the Udaipur resolve only shows the hold of powerful families over Congress and its power structures. This will be a crucial bottleneck in any organisational rejuvenation. Kharje, 80, with a politician son, has the historic opportunity to preside over the liquidation of both gerontocracy and family-based politics by not merely making CWC nominations but also forcing an organisational change by bringing in new faces in every state to build the party and take on the BJP.

The Raipur session turned out to be tame also because of the inability to chart out a clear path of political action beyond big speeches, harsh criticisms and pious hopes. It could have indicated a direction in the matter of forging alliances and action programmes for local units. Through the Bharat Jodo Yatra, Rahul Gandhi had made sure that a broader social and political coalition could be possible. That was a template for a more concrete and yet humble statement on a non-BJP coalition. But it appears that both Rahul and the party are yet to hit the right formula of coalition-making in the face of a ruthless competitor. On the one hand, the old hang-up that Congress is a larger and all-India party still dominates their thinking. On the other hand, the naive plan of an all-India front seems to limit the imagination of the party.

While Congress continues to hold second position, if not first, in many states, its record against the BJP in straight fights is dismal. In view of that, the party should be prepared to be more modest in its dealings with other Opposition parties. Similarly, Congress should know that alliances will have to happen at state level. Right now, the party has forged an alliance with CPM in Tripura even while being in tough competition with it in Kerala. That flexibility needed to reflect in its formal approach to coalition-making.

Another legacy of the Bharat Jodo Yatra was to connect to the common citizen through direct contact and to move beyond social media posts and press statements. How is the party going to awaken the masses on questions of crony capitalism and communalism? This question remained unaddressed at the session. On religion-based communalism, the Congress worker is clueless and apathetic. Criticising the BJP on this count is easy but making sure that the average Hindu is convinced that being anti-Muslim is not necessary for being a good Hindu or a good nationalist is a difficult task and only house-to-house contact by trained workers may help retrieve the cherished claim of inclusivity and co-existence. But it seems that many leaders of the party themselves believe that showing off religious credentials is enough to compete with BJP.

Was Raipur, then, a complete failure? Perhaps not. An unspoken factor dominating the session was the new stature of Rahul Gandhi whom the party old guard will now have to take more seriously. Whether Rahul can take the party with him on many issues remains to be seen. He is emerging as a thinking politician. But he also needs to take the burden of giving an action programme to workers. Much would depend upon how he realises the urgency of this task.

would like to see when it turns 100?

Cooperation amid conflict

As it steers G20 amid renewed great-power rivalry, India must temper its expectations. Reducing the negative impact of conflicts between major powers on the forum will be a diplomatic achievement

THE INABILITY OF the G20 finance ministers to agree on a joint statement last week points to an important reality about multilateralism. When great powers are at peace with each other, multilateralism has reasonable chances of success; but when they are at each other's throats, the room for global cooperation shrinks. Multilateralism, then, is not an activity independent of power politics. The outcome of the gathering of the G20 foreign ministers this week is unlikely to be any different from what we have seen with the finance ministers. The shadow of the great power rivalry on the G20 is only likely to darken in the days ahead as China and Russia consolidate their "alliance without limits" and Washington rallies the collective West to stand up against Moscow and Beijing.

To be functional, multilateral institutions like the G20, United Nations and World Trade Organisation need at least a minimal understanding among the major powers on the global rules of the road. Such an understanding was not obtained during the Cold War except in a few areas like nuclear arms control. Although the UN was set up after the Second World War with the expectation that the great powers would work together, the world saw the allies turn adversaries and sharply divide the world into competing economic and military blocs. After the Soviet Union collapsed in 1991, curtains fell on the prolonged East-West Cold War. It opened doors for an expansive phase of multilateralism for nearly a quarter of a century — whether it was great power cooperation at the UN or in the creation of the WTO.

When the financial crisis of 2008 broke out, the Bush administration rallied the top 20 economies of the world to stabilise the global economy. That world of shared interests among the top nations no longer exists. It is no surprise, then, that consensus on key issues eludes the G20 today.

The simmering political conflict between Russia and the West boiled over into a hot war in the heart of Europe last year. There is a real chance that Washington and Beijing might get into military blows over Taiwan. The rising geopolitical conflict is naturally mirrored in the economic domain. The post-Cold War era saw extensive economic engagement between the US and Europe on the one hand and China and Russia on the other. Differences in ideology and character of the political system did not matter as economic interdependence was beneficial to all.

The last few years have seen diminishing faith in the logic of globalisation as well as active weaponisation of interdependence in the pursuit of their particular national objectives. This has seen efforts by the US and China to reduce their current massive economic exposure to the other. The new economic conflict has also enveloped emerging technologies — especially the digital domain that promises to reshape the global economy as well as restructure the nature of military power in the international system.

This is not a good moment, then, for multilateralism. As it steers the G20 amidst the



renewed rivalry between the major powers, India must temper its expectations from the G20. There is little possibility that the current military, political and economic tensions between the major powers can be mitigated any time soon. Reducing the inevitable negative impact of the renewed great power conflict on the G20 in itself will be a diplomatic achievement for India.

Meanwhile, India's ambition to represent the interests of the Global South at the G20 does not mean Delhi's multilateral diplomacy can stand apart from the great power conflict. India is very much part of the renewed great power rivalry. Delhi's troubled relationship with Beijing is one of the key strands in contemporary geopolitics. This is not just about Beijing's military assertiveness, which has led to the repeated breakdown of peace and tranquillity on India's long and disputed border with China over the last decade. It is also about deep differences between Delhi and Beijing on multilateral issues.

In the past, it was conventional wisdom that Delhi and Beijing could work together in the multilateral domain despite their bilateral problems on the border. That enthusiasm in Delhi has had to be curbed in recent years. China has blocked India's efforts to join the Nuclear Suppliers Group. Beijing does not support Delhi's quest for a permanent seat on the UN Security Council. There is also growing friction in a range of new areas. Consider, for example, India's rejection of China's Belt and Road Initiative when it was unveiled in 2017. Recall too Delhi's move in 2019 to walk out of the Asia-wide trade liberalisation agreement, the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership. The decision was based on the judgement that Delhi can't afford to become a part of a China-dominated regional economic bloc. China's latest initiatives on global security and development have not resonated well in Delhi either.

India also had to fend off Beijing's push, at the behest of Pakistan, to put the Kashmir question back on the active agenda of the UNSC in 2019, following Delhi's constitutional changes to the status of Kashmir in the Indian union. Yet, India continues to sit somewhat uncomfortably with China in various forums like the RIC (Russia-India-China),

BRICS (along with Brazil and South Africa), and the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO). It is also a member of the China-led Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB).

Amidst mounting challenges from China, India has deepened bilateral strategic ties with the US and Europe. Delhi has also revived the Quad forum with Australia, Japan and the US.

The Quad is now one of India's premier multilateral forums. But India does not or can't simply turn its back on China — whose growing economic and military weight makes it a powerful player in the international system. Nor can it ignore Russia, which has just reminded the world of its enormous capacity to disrupt the global order.

Delhi also participates in groupings of "like-minded countries" such as the Quad in the pursuit of national and regional interests. India is also a regular invitee to the G7 forum of advanced industrial democracies. It is also actively trying to resuscitate its past coalition with the Global South. After years of unsuccessful attempts to mobilise the UN to counter cross-border terrorism, Delhi turned to the Financial Action Task Force to put some real pressure on Pakistan.

The diversity of India's multilateralism reflects the structural imperatives of global politics. Delhi has no option but to try and cooperate with its adversaries to solve larger regional and global problems. At the same time, national interests demand that India wrestle with its rivals and collaborate with like-minded countries in the multilateral domain. The relative mix of cooperation and contestation depends on the context and the nature of the specific issue at hand.

Buy, bend, punish

A new model of politics is with us. Targeting of Manish Sisodia presents an opportunity for entire Opposition to unite against an oppressive regime

FEBRUARY 26, 2023, the day Delhi's Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia was arrested in an ongoing investigation by the CBI, will be remembered as a black day in Indian democracy. For, this was the arrest of no ordinary politician. This was the arrest of India's finest education minister, a man of unimpeachable integrity and honesty, and the topmost leader of an Opposition party increasingly being seen as the real challenger to the BJP nationally in the years to come.

The arrest of Manish Sisodia has only laid bare a dark truth for the entire nation and the world to see. India's top investigative agencies are seeing an unprecedented scale of politicisation and abuse at the hands of the Modi government, only to target, harass and arrest Opposition leaders.

This incident also signifies the coming of age of the new "buy-bend-punish" model in Indian politics that the BJP has engineered carefully over the past nine years. Under this model, BJP's struggle and lust for power never really ends with a defeat in elections at the hands of an Opposition party. It only changes gears. It first unleashes Operation Lotus to "buy" out Opposition leaders and get them to switch over to the BJP in order to topple Opposition-led governments.

CBI cases against prominent leaders were targeted at Opposition parties, whereas this figure was 60 per cent under UPA rule. Similarly, 95 per cent of the 121 prominent politicians probed by the ED since 2014 were Opposition leaders, whereas this figure was 54 per cent under UPA rule.

BJP leaders often respond to these harsh truths by asking why fear if you have done nothing wrong. The recent arrest of Manish Sisodia exemplifies why every such instance of harassment of Opposition leaders needs to be questioned and vigorously pushed back by the entire society.

Ever since the CBI and ED launched their probes into Delhi's excise policy a year ago at BJP's behest, Sisodia cooperated with the investigation at every stage. His house and office were raided, his bank lockers were opened up and even his native village was visited by investigation officers to build a case for disproportionate assets. But no such case could be built. Yet, he was arrested on Sunday on the flimsy grounds of alleged non-cooperation. What will follow now is a long series of hearings for bail stretching into months, where the process itself becomes the punishment. The bizarre detention of Satyendar Jain, Delhi's Health Minister, for the past nine months under an ED case, again without any substantive evidence or obtaining any conviction from a court of law, shows how BJP has mastered the process of abusing the law at every stage to harass its political opponents.

In this instance, the real loss will be that of the children of Delhi who no longer have the privilege of calling Sisodia their education minister. Here's a person who has transformed the lives of 18 lakh children by turning around the state of Delhi's government schools. Be it the building of 20,000 swanky new classrooms, introducing innovative happiness and entrepreneurship curricula or getting hundreds of government school students to crack the JEE and NEET exams, or getting hundreds of government school students to crack the JEE and NEET exams, or getting hundreds of government school students to crack the JEE and NEET exams,

If that fails, the threat of launching fresh investigations or taking action under ongoing investigations by the trinity of the Centre's top investigative agencies — CBI, ED and Income Tax (IT) — is imposed upon Opposition leaders to "bend" them into submission. The list of such leaders who have seen their investigations melt into thin air soon after they joined the BJP is endless. Mukul Roy, who is an accused in Narada scam, Suvendra Adhikari who is accused in the Saradha chit fund scam, Himanta Biswa Sarma who is accused in a bribery scam and Narayan Rane who was being probed by the ED for an alleged Rs 300 crore land scam, are but a few examples of prominent Opposition leaders who saw their investigations magically stalled after they joined the BJP. This has also earned the BJP the well-deserved moniker of a "washing machine" party.

While the arrest of Sisodia by the CBI may have been well-orchestrated by the BJP, what they may not have expected is the widespread condemnation of this act by Opposition leaders and chief ministers across political lines. History tells us that there comes a time in every authoritarian regime, when the entire society unites in fighting back causing their ultimate downfall. The BJP's brazen action against Manish Sisodia is the moment for the entire Opposition and the people of India to unite against an oppressive regime — not to save an individual but to save the future of Indian democracy.

AAP is Congress minus dynasty

Amid corruption allegations, its freebie politics is wearing thin

THE ARREST OF the Deputy Chief Minister of Delhi, Manish Sisodia, in an alleged liquor scam continues the unravelling of the carefully crafted image of the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) as an anti-corruption party. AAP came into existence by free-riding on the anti-corruption movement of civil society during the UPA days. The massive corruption, inflation and policy paralysis under the UPA regime created general revulsion against the political class and allowed anarchist forces to find traction in the public imagination.

Several activists and NGOs with opaque backgrounds and sources of funding started sprouting up, claiming to have found miraculous solutions to the challenges facing the country. Often fixated on a single issue and single-point simplistic solution but with a fanatical zeal, they were amply aided by the TRP-hungry media channels. Arvind Kejriwal and others like him hijacked the public sentiment to create the Aam Aadmi Party, promising to end corruption by passing the Jan Lokpal Bill, an ambiguous extra-constitutional body with sweeping powers far superseding those enjoyed by any constitutional post so far.

In the 10 years since, AAP has grown by preying upon a public reeling under the corrupt rule of the Congress party. AAP came to

power in 2015 with much fanfare around its utopian promises and policies. Mohalla clinics, free medicines and consultations; pollution control; traffic and transport management; reforms in education, power, Jal Board, and urban planning and development were some of the promises made to the citizens of Delhi. Despite a second full majority mandate, all these promises still need to be fulfilled.

The entire strategy of AAP has been to run an advertisement blitzkrieg instead of doing any real work on the ground. Delhi's much-touted health and education model is only found in the extensive advertisements in newspapers across the country. Mohalla clinics are an abject failure. An RTI query revealed that no new hospitals had been built under the AAP regime since 2015. It led to a massive bed crunch during the pandemic, resulting in a higher death rate than in other states.

Public transport in Delhi is also collapsing. Fewer buses are seen on the roads as there have been no new acquisitions except Centre-funded electric buses under the FAME-II programme. No new flyovers/roads were built in Delhi in the same period. There were zero colleges or higher education institutions built by the Kejriwal regime and only one school. At the same time, thou-

sands of teaching posts are vacant in Delhi schools, and hundreds of schools are without principals.

State government-funded colleges of Delhi University are facing an acute crunch of funding, with salaries of pensioners, teaching and non-teaching staff often pending for months, with Manish Sisodia allegedly trying to force the appointment of his cronies in the governing bodies as the pre-condition for the timely release of funds. The politics of freebies has resulted in a rapid increase in the Delhi public debt. The state is running a fiscal deficit of more than Rs 9,000 crore. Even its much-advertised revenue surplus is because the Centre pays pension liabilities of its employees, expenditure on police, etc.

The corruption in Delhi has become more institutionalised under AAP. Allegations, like the renting of a party worker's property for a Mohalla clinic way above the market rate, are commonplace. And now the massive liquor scam has exposed AAP for what it is: A syndicate of opportunistic careerists who crave power and wealth at all costs, unrestrained by ethics or morals. AAP has no interest in governing but only seeks to grab more and more power for its dictatorial, visionless leadership. Its victory in Delhi was not used to work for the

betterment of the city, but to leverage it for expansion into Punjab and other states. Just a few months of AAP rule have seen a total collapse of law and order in Punjab, which is being remote-controlled by Kejriwal. Now anarchists have overrun police stations, and the Punjab CM is meeting with Kejriwal and Uddhav Thackeray in Mumbai to plan new electoral alliances.

When faced with a crisis, AAP has abandoned all responsibilities in Punjab just like it left Delhi to its fate during the first and second waves of the pandemic. It has been following a clever policy of intense paid propaganda to construct a false picture of pro-people work in departments like health and education while its ministers indulge in such shenanigans. Delhi is the only state whose health and education ministers are in jail on serious charges of corruption. The same is the story in Punjab where the health minister and MLAs have been found indulging in corruption.

The spell cast by freebie politics and paid propaganda of the AAP is nearing its end. People are realising that AAP is simply Congress 2.0 minus the dynasty.

WEAKNESS CONTINUED TO PERSIST ON GLOBAL AS WELL AS DOMESTIC FRONTS

Sensex falls another 326 points, down 2000 points in seven days

NEW DELHI, FEBRUARY 28

DOMESTIC STOCK markets fell another 0.50 per cent on Tuesday, taking the total loss to 3.34 per cent in the last seven days. The Sensex fell 326 points to 58,962.12 and the NSE Nifty Index lost 89 points at 17,303.95 during the day as the sell-off continued without

any let-up.

With this, the Sensex has lost over 2,000 points in the last seven days as the market is still worried about domestic inflation numbers and global issues like the Ukraine war adding to discomfort with growth projections. Foreign and retail investors remained sellers as concern about high inflation persisted.

Weakness continued to per-

sist on global as well as domestic fronts led by worry over prolonged interest rate cycles. "Nifty opened on a flat note and witnessed continued selling pressure throughout the day to close with a loss of 89 points at 17304 levels. On the sectoral front, it was a mixed bag with realty being top gainer – up more than 1%. Markets are continuously witnessing selling pressure on back of global un-

certainty, consistent FII selling and central banks around the world being hawkish to tame rigid inflation," said Siddhartha Khemka, Head - Retail Research, Motilal Oswal Financial Services Ltd. Moreover, 10-year bond yield hit the high level of 7.45 per cent on Monday which is the highest since November 22, indicating the nervousness in the market. In the last policy meeting, MPC refrained

from giving forward guidance and retained the optionality to be on either side based on incoming data to change their stance to neutral on interest rates.

Global investors' interest in the equity market is weakening due to the slowdown in the economy, led by high inflation and contractionary monetary policy.


CITIBANK, WHICH started its India operations back in 1902 by opening the first branch in Kolkata, witnesses a major transformation with the sale of its retail banking assets to Axis Bank, effective March 1.

Located near Maidan metro station, the branch at Kanak building office now has a rebranded Axis Bank board as latter last year announced the acquisition of Citi's consumer businesses, including branches, ATMs and credit cards, for Rs 12,325 crore.

In a communication to customers, Citi said, "We are pleased to now inform you that Citi and Axis Bank will be completing the sale on March 1, 2023."

From Wednesday, while the branch timings may change, the locations of Citi branches and ATMs will be the same.

The products and services

that you currently hold with Citi will remain Citi-branded till around the second-half of 2024 or until further notification from Axis Bank," the bank said.

The bank account numbers, credit and debit card numbers, cheque books, IFSC, MICR codes of the customers will remain the same and will continue to be serviced by

use the Citi Mobile App or Citibank Online, the bank said. There is no change, at this time, to the earning ratio and redemption process of the reward points, across both Citi Credit and debit cards. "If you hold an insurance policy availed through us, the policy features remain the same and will be continued to be serviced by

Axis Bank. Citibank will be surrendering its Corporate Agency License with no implications on your existing policy," the bank informed its customers. With this acquisition, close to 3 million unique customers of Citibank India will become Axis Bank's customers. Axis Bank's Cards balance sheet will grow by 57 per cent with an additional 2.5 million Citibank cards, making it one of the top 3 cards businesses in the country. The bank had said that the acquisition of Citibank's retail business will help in addition of aggregate deposits of Rs 50,200 crore, of which 81 per cent will be CASA.

"After the pandemic, it is hard

to continue a business that won't survive. Such mergers are very common in England. Many businesses have closed down. It's better to merge with someone so that they can provide quality services. If it is bilaterally beneficial for the consumers and the customer, then it is good," said Dr Prema Lal, a customer of Citi in Kolkata.

The regulator found that these entities have collectively earned an aggregate sum of wrong gains of around Rs 30.56 crore from their trading activities, and directed them to deposit this amount into an interest-bearing escrow account or savings account in a nationalised bank within 15 days.

"Viresh Joshi has conducted himself as a dealer of Axis MF in conceiving a fraudulent scheme and executing the said scheme so meticulously over a sustained period in collusion with other unscrupulous entities to front run the trades of his very own mutual fund where around 66 lakh unit holders have put an aggregate sum of AUM of Rs 2.52 lakh crore (as on March 31, 2022)," Sebi said in the interim order.

Front running means usage of non-public information to directly or indirectly, buy or sell securities or enter into options or futures contracts, in advance of a substantial order, on an impending transaction, in the same or related securities or futures or options contracts, in anticipation that when the information becomes public; the price of such securities or contracts may change.


'India talking to 18 nations for 4G-5G tech stack'

INDIA IS in talks with about 18 countries that want to implement its 4G/5G technology stack, communications and IT minister Ashwini Vaishnaw said Tuesday. He added that the whole country will get 5G coverage by December 2024. "These are some of the best (countries) in the world (that are looking to adopt the stack)," Vaishnaw told reporters.

"This is a 4G/5G stack which is upgradable. What we have installed, that same device will be doing 5G also. Technology has to be tested, ruggedised, then only we will move to the next. That's why we are doing 4G first (with Bharat Sanchar Nigam Ltd.) and then 5G." The IT minister also said that the country has already got 100 patents for 6G telecom technology.

"So this is a journey which is going to be very exciting to see."

Dutt's presence in Oversight committee untenable: Bajrang

THE GROUP of India's top wrestlers levelling allegations of sexual harassment against Wrestling Federation of India (WFI) president Brij Bhushan Singh Sharan have lost faith in an Oversight Committee member, grappler Yogeshwar Dutt, after his coach Rampal Mann was purportedly heard giving details of the hearing during a sting operation by a news channel.

Mann purportedly said that Yogeshwar told him that there was no irrefutable proof about the allegations of sexual harassment against the WFI president. In the nearly seven-minute long video, the coach also gives details of what two alleged victims said before the Oversight Committee and attributed the information he had to London Olympics bronze-medal winner Yogeshwar.

Following the telecast of the sting operation video by ABP News, Tokyo Olympics bronze-medal winner Bajrang Punia, one of the wrestlers who protested at Jantar Mantar last month demanding the removal of Brij Bhushan as WFI president, said that Yogeshwar being a member of the committee was untenable now.

"Yogeshwar should resign on his own from the Oversight Committee or he should be removed from the committee. He has no moral right to remain a member of the committee since it is clear that he does not believe in confidentiality. This is a sensitive matter related to women wrestlers. Each one of them has shown courage to come forward and talk. But instead of trying to understand the sensitive nature of the issue, Yogeshwar seems to be keen to belittle them. We have lost trust in him because he won't be on the side of justice," Bajrang told *The Indian Express* on Tuesday.

It is learnt that WFI president Brij Bhushan, a BJP MP, appeared before the Oversight Committee for the first time on Tuesday in New Delhi. Yogeshwar too was present, an official said.

Bajrang said that everyone who was part of the hearing, including the Oversight Committee members, had to give an undertaking of confidentiality.

"We have spoken to sports ministry officials about us being extremely unhappy with what Yogeshwar is doing. We have emailed the committee members. He should leave the committee on his own when it came to light that he was telling his coach everything that happens during hearings. It is about the security of wrestlers, we all know how pow-

Absence of top wrestlers felt

WITH SOME of the country's top wrestlers skipping the UWW Ranking Series events and other international competitions till action is taken against WFI president Brij Bhushan Singh Sharan, India won just four medals in the first two events. In Alexandria, Egypt, Ankit Gulia won a bronze in Greco Roman (72 kg), while Reetika, an Asian Under-23 Champion, won a freestyle bronze (72 kg).

In the first ranking series of the year in Zagreb, Croatia, the medal tally was two. Aman Sehrawat won a bronze in the 57 kg while Greco-Roman wrestler Ashu won another bronze in the 67 kg category.

The 'media reports' Vinesh refers to is the sting operation in which Yogeshwar's coach Mann is the focus.

Mann is purportedly heard saying that there was no evidence related to the sexual harassment allegations. According to Mann, one girl told the committee that Brij Bhushan had asked for her number but there was no conversation over the phone between them.

Another girl said that she did not feel comfortable about Brij Bhushan placing his hand on her shoulder after she returned after winning a medal.

Olympic medallist-boxer Mary Kom heads the Oversight committee which also includes former badminton player and Mission Olympic Cell member Trupti Murgund, former CEO of the Target Olympic Podium Scheme Rajesh Rajgopal, and former Sports Authority of India executive director (teams) Radhika Sreeman.

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In January, accusing Brij Bhushan of sexual harassment, Vinesh Phogat, a two-time World Championships medallist had said, "Women wrestlers have been sexually harassed at national camps by coaches and also the WFI president."

On Sunday Vinesh had tweeted, "It has come to my recent awareness that a sportsperson member of the Oversight Committee has been allegedly leaking contents of the complaint of sexual harassment while reading certain media reports since yesterday. Being a sportsperson it is ex-

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Before first ball, a talent show

With sublime batting at nets, Shubman Gill makes a pressing case for inclusion in the XI ahead of Rahul for the third Test against Australia

BEHIND THE practice nets tucked in the corner of the ground are wooden benches in bright blue and yellow shades under grey concrete roofs, standing out like relics amidst plastic seats and glassed, air-conditioned boxes beneath canopy-roofs. The contrast captures the soul of Indore—a modern but self-contained city that blends imperceptibly with its storied, royal past, that is yet to embrace the garish opulence of most aspirational cities in the country.

The ambience makes everything around it feel quieter, even a touch lazier. You could hear the graze of stud marks on earth as Rohit Sharma and Shubman Gill strolled into the nets, the firm thud off the bat on the turf, the excited whisper of the net bowlers, restlessly tossing the ball in their hands to display their craft against two of the finest batsmen around, two most graceful stroke-makers in the world. The net bowlers, mostly in their late teens spotting scraggly stubbles, converged beside the nets where Sharma was batting. But soon their collective gaze would fix on Gill.

For the next hour or so, Gill made the eyes of scattered onlookers converge into him with a blaze of sumptuous strokes, as fulfilling as any net session would be, offering a peek into his boundless talent and irresistible touch. So much so that he made people forget that Rohit was batting beside him, he made people stop their work and watch him bat, not even in a real match but during an optional practice session. Even Rohit would throw appreciative glances at his colleague.

Whether Gill plays the Test or not is uncertain—in a sense it is pointless to debate or dwell too long if he should or not—but the appeal of his batting is irresistible, endowed with a hypnotic quality that pulls you into it. Gill could make you marvel even with his leaves, even with his stance. Tall and upright, the upper body leaning forward, bat held firmly but not stiffly, beside his back leg, the alignment of his body micro-honed to perfection, almost a statue-like symmetry, a photograph of his stance from side-on could don the walls of an art gallery.

The movements are measured to perfection, but without a scintilla of artificiality. To the pitched-up ball, the front-foot strides out. Whereas in the past, he did have a tendency to play from the crease, letting his reach and hands bail him out of danger; these days the front-foot stride is more definite and longer. It's when he meets the ball that his real genius unfurls. He would instruct the net-bowlers to pound the innocuous between the good-and-full length areas on the fifth stump. Some he would defend, some others he would crunch through covers, flexing his back-knee, almost scrapping it on the abrade surface. The same balls, he would drive down ground, either side of the bowler. No one in the nets on Tuesday struck the ball as sweetly melodiously, as he did. Often, he would stare at Vikram Rathour, perched beside the net bowlers. Rathour would just keep nodding in a pleased manner. Apart from a couple of instances, the batting coach had hardly any advice to offer Gill.

Shortly, he shifted the gears, from steady to supersonic, pulling and cutting, along the ground and in the air, even short of good length balls. He would jink down the track to the spinners and loft them into the stands over the head and beyond the enclosure where head coach Rahul Dravid was overseeing a close-in catching drills. Screams of "watch out, watch out," would cut through the wispy forenoon breeze.

Often, Rohit would chuckle from the nets side-by-side, though Gill, wrapped in a bubble of intense focus, heard nothing. Rohit batted chaotically, edging a brace of on-the-rise drives, and getting beaten in the flight when stepping down. There was a casualness about Rohit's batting, maybe perhaps it was an optional session, and he knows that he is in fine touch in the series. It's not a luxury Gill could afford, for whom even an optional batting nets session is an opportunity to stake his claims, to reassert his touch, to put another foot forward to sealing a Test XI spot.

If Gill indeed replaces Rahul in Indore, it would be because he is too irresistible a talent to be resisted any longer.

He indeed replaces Rahul in Indore—just because he had been batting rigorously in the nets for the last couple of days, and Rahul was not spotted on Tuesday does not suggest that he would certainly replace the incumbent opener—it would be because he is too irresistible a talent to be resisted any longer.

His touch has been so gorgeous that it could overshadow the tough runs Rahul had made in orchestrating two of India's most memorable wins abroad in recent times. It's not that Rahul, himself a precious talent, should be given an extended rope, but just that Gill is riding through a rich vein of form that could no longer be ignored, which he has been illustrating in every competitive outing, and even in non-competitive ones like optional nets.

His third last Test innings was a thirdnings hundred in Bangladesh; his last four ODI knocks read 116, 208, 40 not out and 112; his last T20 outing yielded 126 not out. He has not nudged and knocked at the doors of a Test spot, but barged through the doors.

The dilemma of Rohit and the team-management is understandable. To drop or not to drop a batsman they trust to crack the consistency code but riding through stormy times for another gifted batsman who is in golden touch. The team is winning, and maybe Rahul, a batsman they have invested so heavily, could give another shot at redemption. The other side to the logic is that, an in-form batsman would make a great team look greater.

Opening is one of the few spots that remain a concern in this team, now that Virat Kohli too has shown signs of rediscovering his Test-match touch.

The Gill or Rahul question has dominated press conferences since Rahul's failures in Nagpur and Delhi. The stripping of vice-captaincy seemed another clear sign of Gill's comeback, though Rohit, now bored of the question, dead-batted another prodding in his latest press conference. "I spoke about it after the last game as well. Players who are going through a tough time, given their potential they will be given enough time to prove themselves," he said.

A touch irritated, he added: "Being vice-captain or otherwise doesn't tell you anything. At that point in time he was the vice-captain. His removal as vice captain doesn't indicate anything."

Perhaps it would not indicate anything, but if Gill displaces him in Indore it would be not so much of the team management's waning faith in Rahul's abilities as the un-ignorable talent and touch of Gill. Even the wooden benches in blue and yellow beside the nets could tell how supremely he batted in the nets.

Shami likely to be replaced by Umesh

IN A move to manage Mohammad Shami's workload, India are likely to rest him from the third Test in Indore, and replace him with Umesh Yadav. And KL Rahul is also likely to make way for Shubman Gill to play his first Test of the series.

In a series where spinners have bowled the maximum number of overs, Shami has bowled only 29.7 overs in three innings. However, it is understood that a red flag has been raised with regards to Shami's workload and with the Indian Premier League set to follow, the team management has decided to rest him.

With Jasprit Bumrah already sidelined for a lengthy period, India are not willing to take many chances with Shami as in Umesh they have a very reliable replacement. Especially, with the world Test championship to be played in England where Shami would be the key man of the attack.

Since coming in as a last-minute replacement for the injured Bumrah in the T20 World Cup last October-November, Shami was rested for the tours of New Zealand and Bangladesh that followed. No longer part of India's T20 squads, he has played five of the six ODIs that were played before the Border-Gavaskar Trophy. The decision to rest and rotate players is now taken by the team management based on reports from the strength and conditioning coach and physio.

Umesh has been counted upon regularly in the past to deliver in home conditions. Since the start of 2017, no pacer has taken more wicks than Umesh's 65 in Indian conditions and his strike-rate of 37.8 in the period is second only to Shami. And he is the only Indian pacer to take two five-wicket hauls in the said period. With his ability to hit the deck hard and tremendous air speed, Umesh is a valued asset in home conditions for India and is also quite effective when it comes to reverse-swing.

Gill coming in place of Rahul is very much on expected lines. Even before the series began, there were questions about the Karnataka opener's place. However the Indian team management continued to back Rahul, especially because of his overseas performances. But in the two Tests that he played this series, Rahul has scores of 20, 17 & 1 and seldom looked in his usual elements at Nagpur and Delhi.

At the end of the Delhi Test, Captain Rohit Sharma and head coach Rahul Dravid insisted that Rahul's performance in England and South Africa makes a strong case for them to stick with Rahul. However at the end of the Test, as the selectors sat down to pick the squad for the remaining two Tests, Rahul ended up losing the vice-captain tag.

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
